## **Calendar Description**

## **Learning Outcomes**

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Speak conversationally in German on the topics covered in class (family, day-to-day living, etc.)
- Ask and answer simple questions in German on the topics covered
- Understand simple spoken language on the topics covered
- Write correctly in simple German sentences on the topics covered
- Answer questions about and/or summarize the content of simple German written passages
- Incorporate information about German culture as covered in the course into work produced

These objectives correspond to the beginning or 'Breakthrough' levels established by the internationally recognized Common European Framework of Reference (CEFR).

## **Common European Framework of Reference (CEFR)**

Level A1 of Language Proficiency

Listening	I can understand familiar words and very basic phrases concerning myself, my family, and immediate concrete surroundings when people speak slowly and clearly.
Reading	I can understand familiar names, words, and very simple sentences, for example on notices, on posters and in catalogues.
Spoken Interaction	I can interact in a simple way, provided the other person is prepared to repeat or rephrase things at a slower rate of speech and help me formulate what I am trying to say. I can ask and answer simple questions in areas of immediate need or on very familiar topics.

## **Classroom Participation/Attendance**

Part of the final grade will be based on student activity/participation in the classroom. This includes speaking (including accuracy of grammar and pronunciation), willingness to participate in class and group activities, preparedness and attentiveness in answering questions.

Since learning activities are cumulative, 100% class and lab attendance will enhance the student's chance of success. Students who attend less than 90% of class and lab times may be required to withdraw from the course. ## Language Lab

The language lab is a vital component of this course, as it provides the individual speaking, pronunciation and listening practice indispensable to learning a second language in a non-immersion environment. Classroom time alone is not sufficient for successfully acquiring speaking and listening skills.

Each week you will be given lab work and/or testing that may be done either in the lab (AE 200) or off-site; you must submit your lab assignments by the date/time indicated.

Language lab assistants are available during lab opening hours to provide assistance to language students. Your instructor is available to provide assistance with lab assignments as well.

Learning a new language requires daily and consistent application on the part of the learner. It is better to do a small amount of review and study each day than to wait and then attempt to absorb large amounts of material at one sitting. Learning another language also demands regular practice articulating sounds and expressions. Hence, language lab work is essential and mandatory.

# Oral presentations

Oral presentations will be held during and/or towards the end of the semester. Instructions are available on the course website.

#### **Tests**

There will be no scheduled mid-term or final exam in this course. Instead, a series of cumulative tests will be given over the course of the semester. They may include aural and oral components.

Modern Languages policy states that the last test will NOT be returned to students to keep. Students may see their marked last test in class or in the instructor's office, but must return them immediately.

#### INTEGRITY CREATES WORKABLITY

Without integrity, nothing works.

I view integrity not as something that is either good or bad, right or wrong, but rather as a state of being whole and complete that results in increased levels of workability.

As a student, you will be asked to give our word to policies, rules and timelines. In the interest of workability, I request that you **keep your word**, and if you cannot keep your word, that you **honour your word**.

What does this look like?

- When you give your word you give it in the context of "I will make this happen".
- However if it turns out that you cannot keep your word, you can always honour your word:
  - 1. As soon as you know that you will not be keeping your word, **inform the relevant parties**.
  - 2. Give a **new timeline**, or say that you will not do it at all.
  - 3. Clean up the mess you created.

Please be aware that we human beings have a very strong need to be admired. You could say that we are **wired to be admired**. Being asked to honour our word if we cannot keep our word may feel like a threat to that need to look good. Thus, we may experience the sudden need to ignore the issue and cover up.

Please don't surrender to this temptation. Instead, communicate with the relevant parties in a straight-up manner. I promise there will be no "repercussions" or "punishments" meted out. Research shows that people who honour their word if they cannot keep their word, actually gain the admiration of others, rather than lose it. Counter intuitive-but true.

Bottom line: Operating from this model of integrity gives all of us permission to hold each other accountable in an adult, straight-forward, matter-of-fact manner.

No blame.

No shame.

Just workability.
